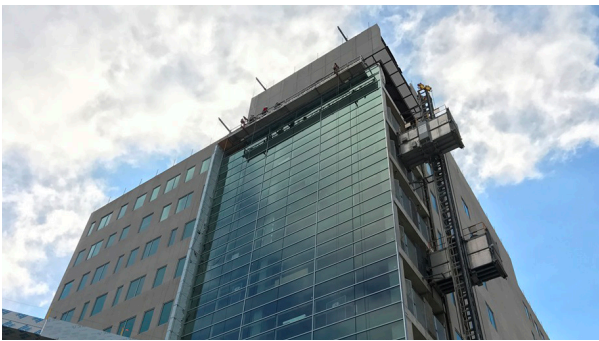

HCC BUILDS A LEGACY OF STUDENT SUCCESS FROM THE GROUND UP



Improving campus facilities to create the ultimate student experience is a priority for Houston Community College (HCC). The 2013 Capital Improvements Program (CIP) projects support workforce readiness and improve the overall quality of HCC's learning environments. Now, many of the college's CIP projects are nearing completion on budget.

Organizational Stewardship, one of the key pillars of HCC's strategic plan, contributed to the overall financial success of these projects. The 2013 CIP is 75 percent complete and within budget. These projects are also LEED Silver Certified, which stands for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design. It is the most widely used green building rating system in the world. Building to LEED standards saves energy and resources during the lifecycle of the facility. As a result, these projects generate significant financial savings compared to the average commercial building.

These facilities are optimized to be economically prudent to operate while being uniquely suited to support HCC's 15 Centers of Excellence. Fiscal responsibility is a driving factor through all phases of CIP development, including the repayment of the CIP debt. During the recent State of the College address, HCC Chancellor Cesar Maldonado announced that the college recently accelerated payment of \$12 million of debt ahead of schedule.

"We are working together to create innovative solutions that ensure our students have the tools to generate powerful results once they leave HCC and enter the workforce," said HCC Chancellor Cesar Maldonado during his State of the College address. HCC offers more than 250 associate degree and certificate programs. Ensuring each program has the resources it needs to help students on their pathway to success is a priority for HCC.



HCC HOSTS ANNUAL BLACK HISTORY GALA

The Honorable Teta V. Banks, an internationally known leader and educator who works to educate, inspire and mobilize Americans to support the efforts of the United Nations, was the keynote speaker of the 2017 Houston Community College Black History Scholarship Gala. This year's theme for the gala was Thinking Globally Acting Locally.

Each year the Black History Committee raises funds to support scholarships for low-to and moderate-income students with an emphasis on African American students at HCC. Recipients receive a \$1,000 scholarship to help cover the cost of tuition and books. To date, the organization has raised more than \$60,000 for college scholarships, trips to local colleges and summer camp activities for youth and children.

During the event Anthony Chase, former president of the Greater Houston Partnership, and current business leader and executive, along with Gene Locke, former Houston City Attorney and HCC Trustee, were recognized with the 2017 Joyce M. Reynolds Lifetime Achievement Award. In addition, it was announced that the 2017 Unstoppable Leadership Gallery Inductees were Kandi Eastman, award-winning radio personality for KMJQ-FM/Magic 102.1, and Pastor Byron Stevenson and his wife Sonya Taylor Stevenson of The Fort Bend Church.
